General information

Summary

The discipline is aimed at gaining knowledge of the regularities of the functioning of economic microsystems in various market situations and the ability to use them effectively. The basic principles of classical microeconomics at the intermediate level are taught. The ability to substantiate economic decisions using modern tools is developed.

Course objectives and goals

The ability to investigate trends in the development of the economy using the tools of microeconomic analysis, to make generalizations regarding the assessment of the manifestation of individual phenomena that are characteristic of modern processes in the economy.

Format of classes

Lectures, practical classes, course work, consultations. Final control in the form of an exam.
