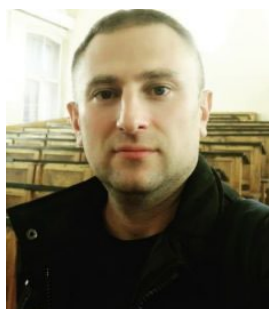

General information

Summary

Within the course, the student is offered an introduction, study and practical application of the latest knowledge on the history of Ukrainian state formation. The course is presented in the form of a number of blocks related to the main stages of the national and political development of Ukrainian lands

Course objectives and goals

The course is objected to form an understanding of the development of Ukrainian statehood from Kyivan Rus to the present. The goal of the course is to acquire fundamental knowledge of the history of Ukrainian statehood, as a basis for forming the worldview of a responsible citizen, a carrier of intellectual, moral and aesthetic qualities worthy of a highly educated specialist..

Format of classes

Lectures, consultations, self-study. Final control in the form of an credit test

Features of the course, teaching and learning methods, and technologies

The course includes lecture classes that take place in an interactive form with discussion of the material, presentations and discussions in seminar classes

Program of the course

Topics of the lectures

Topic 1-2. General concept of the state, its essential characteristics and role in society. Concepts of the state.

Basic terms and concepts of the history of Ukrainian statehood. Basic concepts and interpretation of the concept of the state in scientific literature. The place of the problems of Ukrainian statehood in the research field of various scientific schools.

Topic 3-4. Historiography and corpus of sources on the history of Ukrainian statehood. The establishment of the first state institutions. Statehood in the lands of Ukraine in the pre-Kyivan Rus times.

The main stages of the development of the historiography of Ukrainian statehood. The place of the problems of Ukrainian statehood in the research field of various scientific schools. The first forms of statehood in the lands of Ukraine in pre-Slavic times. Ancient states of the Northern Black Sea region. The Norman debate: interpretation and arguments of the parties.

Topic 5-6. Kyivan Rus statehood.

The evolution of the political system of Kyivan Rus during the period of formation, prosperity and political fragmentation. State institutions of the Kyiv and Galicia-Volyn states.

Topic 7-8. Ukrainian Cossack statehood and self-government.

Organization of Zaporozhian Sich its territorial division. The formation of the Ukrainian Cossack state during the reign of Bohdan Khmelnytskyi. Hetman state of the last quarter of the 17th - 18th centuries: form of government, state. institutions, administrative-territorial system, main strata of the population. Peculiarities of the Sloboda Ukraine regiments in comparison with other forms of Cossack self-government. The decline of the Hetmanate and the elimination of the autonomous rights of Cossack Ukraine.

Topic 9-10. The formation of the statist idea in the Ukrainian socio-political thought of the modern era.

The Ukrainian national movement during the "long" 19th century. The emergence of political parties, the evolution of their political views. The independent idea in the Ukrainian movement at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries.

Topic 11-12. Ukrainian states during the Revolution of 1917-1921.

The Ukrainian People's Republic led by the Central Rada. The Ukrainian State of Pavlo Skoropadskyi. Western Ukrainian People's Republic. The Ukrainian People's Republic, managed by the Directory. The idea of unity in the events of the revolution of 1917-1921.

Topic 13-14. The role and place of Ukraine in the political system and national-state structure of the USSR.

Ukrainian conservatism as one of the directions of the Ukrainian statist idea in the period between the world wars. OUN, its ideology, struggle for Ukrainian statehood. The Ukrainian factor in the geopolitical shifts caused by the Second World War. The main directions of the Ukrainian dissident movement in the

Ukrainian SSR. The influence of the perestroika policy on the national question in the USSR. The emergence and activity of the People's Movement of Ukraine in the late 1980s and early 1990s. **Topic 15-16. Gaining independence and problems of state formation. Contemporary challenges for the Ukrainian state.**

The Declaration on the State Sovereignty of Ukraine and the Act of Proclamation of Independence of Ukraine: a comparative analysis of historical documents. Distribution of powers and responsibilities between the branches of government, as well as the main state institutions in modern Ukraine. The Ukrainian state during the Russo-Ukrainian war.

Topics of the workshops

Topic 1. General concept of the state and its role in society. Concepts of the state.

Topic 2. Statehood on the territory of modern Ukraine in pre-Kyivan Rus times.

Topic 3. Kyiv and Galicia-Volyn states.

Topic 4. Ukrainian Cossack statehood.

Topic 5. The Ukrainian national movement and the formation of the statist idea in the "long" 19th century.

Theme 6. Ukrainian states during the period of the Ukrainian revolution of 1917-1921.

Topic 7. The role and place of Ukraine in the political system and national-state structure of the USSR. Soviet national quasi-state.

Topic 8. The collapse of the Soviet Union and the formation of the contemporary Ukrainian state. Problems of state formation.

Self-study

In order to master the necessary quality of knowledge in the discipline, regular self-study is necessary. Missed lectures and seminars are worked off in the form of preparation of additional individual tasks. Students perform the following types of work (individual homework): writing historical essays, a written task - control work based on the results of the lecture course, preparation of an essay. These activities are based on studying the recommended and additional literature, watching videos and working with scientific articles. Performance of these types of self-study is mandatory.
